



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**UPDATES NEEDED FOR TOWNSHIP SPONSORED PROGRAMS FOR SENIOR CITIZENS**

As announced in the Spring Newsletter, The Board of Supervisors continues to offer "FREE" trash and recycling for Senior Citizens, age 67 or older. The Senior Citizen must also be the owner AND occupant of the property. The program would result in a savings of \$160.16 per year.

The Board also continued to offer "FREE" ambulance service for senior citizens, age 67 and older. This program would result in a savings of \$35.00 a year for a single senior citizen or \$55 for a family membership (2 or more senior citizens in the same household).

**For those residents who have already registered for the ambulance service, once your spouse turns age 67, you must register him/her for the program too.** Otherwise, the Township currently is only paying a subscription for the person that has registered and not the spouse. The spouse must submit proof of age (driver's license, medicare card or other valid information indicating date of birth) to the Township Office.

**FINDLAY TOWNSHIP COMMUNITY FAIR PARADE ROUTE 30 CLOSING**

All residents should be aware that Route 30 in Clinton will be closed on Saturday morning, August 16th from approximately 10:30 AM to 11:30 AM for the Findlay Township Community Fair Parade. Motorists will be required to use an alternate route during the parade.

Traffic delays may also occur on the day of the Semi-Great Race and Fun Walk on Friday, August 15th at 7:00 PM as runners cross Route 30 while completing the race course.

### HERSHEY'S BAKING CONTESTS

The Hershey's Baking Chips Cookie, Brownie or Bar Contest and the Hershey's Cocoa Cake Contest will be held again this year during the Findlay Township Community Fair.

For the Cocoa Cake contest, entry must be a layered cake made from scratch and frosted using a minimum of 1/4 cup of Hershey's Cocoa and, if frosted, Hershey's Cocoa must be used. Cake entries must be submitted for judging on cardboard.

For the Baking Chips Cookie, Brownie or Bar Contest, exhibitor must be an individual age 8 through and including 18 years. Entries must be a plate of six made from scratch using a minimum of 1/4 cup of Hershey's Baking Chips. If the entry is frosted, Hershey's Cocoa must be used. Entry must be submitted for judging on a doily covered cardboard.


Premiums for both categories are \$10 for First Place, \$8 for Second Place, and \$6 for Third Place.

The Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest will again be conducted at this year's Findlay Township Community Fair.

Each pie will be judged on the overall appearance crust-color, flavor, texture and doneness, filling consistency, and creativity. Do not limit your pie to a traditional two-crust apple pie. Be creative with a variety of fillings as long as the pie includes at least 60% apples in the filling.

Premiums for the contest are \$10 for First Place, \$8 for Second Place and \$6 for Third Place winners.



### Caregivers of Special Needs Residents:

Within our community we have residents who sometimes require special attention from our emergency services. In these cases, a police officer, fireman and or paramedic may not be familiar with the individual's special needs. While responding to an emergency call or simply contacting them in public the potential is there to mis-read, improperly diagnose or identify what in fact has truly happened or what the individual is trying to communicate. Earlier this year, the Allegheny County District Attorney's Office instituted a program to help break down these barriers in order that those special needs residents are identified so that emergency service providers are better equipped to handle their needs. Project Lifesaver was instituted throughout Allegheny County and I'm proud to say that The Findlay Township emergency service providers are a part of the plan.

Located at the Police Department are individual packets that each caregiver of a special needs resident can take home, complete and return to the department. The packet contains information on services available from the Autism Society of Pittsburgh, special services K-9's, home locking and tracking devices (Project Lifesaver). Once the information sheet in the packet is complete, the caregiver can simply return the document to our dispatch center. Please remember to update the Police Department should there be any changes to this information. The information will then be entered into our record management system and will alert the officers and dispatchers during an emergency that the address or name provide may need extra or special attention.

### Real Estate Tax Office

Township Tax bills were mailed April 1st, with a discount of May 31st. Face was due July 31st, 2014 and are now in Penalty. We are proud to announce that the millage remained the same at 1.60 mills.

The 2014 school bills were mailed on July 1, 2014 and you should have received them by now. They are due at the 2% discount by August 31st. If you did not receive your bill, call the Real Estate Tax Office (724) 695-2995 and copies will be mailed to you.

**IF you have paid off your mortgage and/or changed mortgage companies YOU must notify us of the change.**

The millage for the school remains at 18.51 mills. The Homestead Act is giving a reduction of \$10,729.00 in Assessed Value. This will amount to \$198.59 reduction in your 2014 school tax bill. The County of Allegheny grants the Homestead Act and passes the information on to us. If you have not already done so, Act 50 forms can be downloaded from the County Website or you can call this office to apply for 2015.

Act 77 is the Senior Citizen Tax Relief Program. Again, forms must be filed at County of Allegheny and they pass the information on to the Tax Office. This form can also be downloaded or you can call this office to apply for 2015.

County of Allegheny has announced the remaining dates for "Late Appeals". All forms must be submitted by August 14, 2014 at 2:00 PM, October 9, 2014 at 2:00 PM and the Final date, December 18, 2014 at 2:00 PM.

### PROPERTY TAX/RENT REBATE APPLICATION DEADLINE EXTENDED TO END OF YEAR

The deadline for older adults and residents with disabilities to apply for Pennsylvania's Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program has been extended from June 30 to December 31.

The department has extended the program deadline to ensure eligible applicants have time to apply for the tax relief they're owed," Secretary of Revenue Dan Meuser said. "About 600,000 older Pennsylvanians and residents with disabilities are expected to benefit from the program.

Each year the department evaluates the program as the statutory June 30 application deadline approaches to determine if funds are available to extend the deadline. To date, funding has been available to allow all who qualify to take advantage of this tax relief.

The rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 annually for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded.

The maximum standard rebate is \$650, but supplemental rebates for qualifying homeowners can boost rebates to \$975.

As of May 30, the Revenue Department had received 463, 672 rebate applications. As specified by law, rebate distribution will begin on July 1. After June 30, rebates will be distributed as claims are received and processed.

**Applicants may obtain Property Tax/Rent Rebate claim forms (PA-1000) and related information online at [www.revenue.state.pa.us](http://www.revenue.state.pa.us) or by calling, toll-free, 1-888-222-9190.**

It costs nothing to apply for a rebate. In response to continued inquiries regarding fee-based application filing services offered privately, the department reminds residents that free application assistance is available at hundreds of locations across the state, including Department of Revenue district offices, local Area Agencies on Aging, senior centers and state legislators' offices.

Claimants who already applied for rebates may check the status of claims online at [www.revenue.state.pa.us](http://www.revenue.state.pa.us) or by calling, toll-free, 1-888-PATAXES.

The Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program is one of five programs supported by the Pennsylvania Lottery. Since the program's 1971 inception, older and disabled adults have received more than \$5.6 billion worth of property tax and rent relief. The expanded portion of the rebate program is also supported with revenue from slots gaming.



# Heroes Supporting Heroes



Heroes Supporting Heroes is a non-profit organization started by John and Shari Lee which provides assistance to residents in local communities including Findlay and North Fayette. Currently working with 135 volunteers, many of whom are Civil Engineers; Heroes Supporting Heroes assists with home repairs, grass cutting, painting, plumbing and water heater repairs, roof repairs and many other much needed projects for residents who are not able to perform these repairs themselves. These volunteers give of their time, energy and resources to help others.

This year Heroes Supporting Heroes teamed up with Work Camp who brought 400+ youth to the West Allegheny High School from June 22 - 28th to complete 70 home projects, with the majority of those projects in the Findlay and North Fayette area. In advance of the student's arrival, a fund raising effort was put into place to feed the volunteers and purchase materials. Mr. Lee reported their organization had already completed 48 projects since August 2013.

At their February 27, 2014 workshop meeting, the Findlay Township Board of Supervisors presented John Lee with a check for \$5,000 so that Heroes Supporting Heroes can continue to assist the families of deployed and injured soldiers, the elderly and others in our community that are in need. The donation was funded entirely by insurance dividends received by the Township.

## FINDLAY TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL AUTHORITY NEWS

### PROJECT UPDATES:

#### 1. Imperial Waterline Replacement

FTMA is currently working to replace a majority of the waterline on Church, Kearns, High, Marshall, Anna, and Nancy Streets. This project is part of FTMA's Capital Improvement Plan and coincides with our goal to replace aging and undersized infrastructure. In addition, new waterline services will be run to each property and fire hydrants will be added where needed. Work is expected to be completed by the end of August 2014.

#### 2. Phase III – Water Transmission Line

The 3rd and final phase of the water transmission line project that brings water from our supplier, the Municipal Authority of Robinson Township, to our water distribution system, is ready for bidding. This project will install approx. 17,000 feet of 16" waterline between Burgettstown Road and McClaren Road. The waterline will mostly traverse Airport Authority property, minimizing customer disturbances, service outages, and utility conflicts. We anticipate construction to start sometime in late 2014. FTMA has received two grants to help fund the project; a federal grant from the Economic Development Administration for \$1,800,000 and a PA State grant from the H2O fund in the amount of \$1,500,000. The project should be completed by the spring of 2015.

#### 3. Potato Garden Run Sewage Treatment Plant

FTMA has started with the initial stages of survey and engineering for the expansion of the Potato Garden Run sewage treatment plant located on Strauss Road. This plant currently services a majority of the Clinton area along with the Westport Development sites. Due to the development in the area, expansion of the plant will be needed in the near future.

#### 4. MXU Replacement Program

FTMA technicians are working to replace aging and outdated MXU boxes. These tan colored boxes are usually located on the outside of your house and are used to communicate meter reading information to a mobile computer unit. You may see an FTMA technician working in your neighborhood replacing these units. All FTMA employees have ID badges. In most cases, the technician will not need to enter the home to replace the MXU.

### Other News:

#### 1. FTMA now offers E-BILLING.

E-Bill is a convenient way to receive and view your water/sewer bill every month. Customers who enroll in this service will receive a PDF attachment of their bill to the provided email address. In addition, when signing up for this service, you will receive a \$3.00 discount on the Administration Charge per bill (That is a savings of \$36 annually). Call the Office at 724-695-3108 to sign up for E-Bill.

#### 2. Effective January 1, 2015, FTMA will no longer accept cash as a form of payment.

The following methods can be used to pay your water/sewer bill: Check, Money Order, Credit Card, and ACH Debit Withdrawal. A drop box is also available to our customers for after hour payments. It is located in the rear of the Municipal Building.

#### 3. Looking for an easy way to pay your bill every month without writing out checks or using stamps?

Sign up for ACH Direct Debit and have your monthly water sewer bill automatically withdrawn from your bank account on the due date of each month. Contact the FTMA Office or go to [www.findlay.pa.us](http://www.findlay.pa.us) under Municipal Authority to download the ACH Agreement form.

#### 4. If you are a property owner in Findlay Township and have rental agreements with tenants, please be aware that effective July 1, 2013, all water and sewer bills will be in the owner's name.

We would appreciate keeping us up to date with your current tenant information. This will become necessary for water emergencies and/or any access we may need to the water meter.



## SWIFTREACH 911 NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

Several years ago, the Police Department contracted with Swiftreach Networks, Inc. as the Township's Emergency Notification service provider. SWIFT911 is a high speed notification program with the capability of delivering recorded messages to the entire community via telephone, e-mail, text or pager. Currently, there are over 1,800 phone numbers in the Township's database.

The system is also in use by the Findlay Township Municipal Authority to report water breaks or upcoming work, by the Administration Office and Recreation Department to notify the community of upcoming events.

## COMPUTER AND APPLIANCE RECYCLING

Now that the landfills are no longer accepting televisions and electronic equipment, Findlay Township is recycling more than ever! Our partner, JVS Environmental, guarantees data destruction for computers and phones and that no parts of the equipment that is turned in will end up in landfills.

We had a fabulous turnout at our June Recycling event with close to 100 vehicles dropping off three trucks full of equipment to be recycled. Thank you to all who participated and adhered to the one television per vehicle request.

All computers, monitors, printers, laptops, non-Freon appliances, telephones, keyboards, mouses, and radios will be accepted for FREE. Appliances with Freon will be accepted, including dehumidifiers, for a \$15 fee.

### TELEVISIONS:

Because the landfills and the thrift stores like Goodwill are no longer accepting televisions, the recyclers have been inundated with tv's. The television manufacturers are mandated to pay for a portion of recycling, but so far, the manufacturers have not been keeping pace with the amount of televisions that are being recycled.

For this reason, JVS is only able to accept **ONE TELEVISION PER VEHICLE** at this recycling event. We have negotiated with JVS so that there is no fee for that television (so they can be any size) but the number accepted is restricted to one.

Additionally, JVS Environmental does not have the ability to transport picture tubes that have been removed from televisions, so PLEASE leave the picture tubes in the television.




## ADULT PROGRAMS

# Valley Ambulance Authority - EMS Dedicated For Life!

Valley Ambulance Authority (“VAA”) is proud to serve as the designated provider of emergency medical services for Findlay Township. VAA also provides EMS services to neighboring communities including Moon Township, Crescent Township, Coraopolis and Neville Island.

In an effort to keep residents of Findlay Township safe and to help prevent injuries, please review the following important information:

## BOUNCE HOUSES AND TRAMPOLINE USAGE

Many Findlay Township residents have probably heard about the recent bounce house incidents, where inflatable structures went airborne with children still inside them! Two of these events occurred in May 2014 alone, in New York and Colorado. Unfortunately, these preventable incidents have been happening for some time, but have recently increased in number.

According to one study by doctors at Nationwide Children’s Hospital, injuries related to bounce houses have more than doubled between 2008 and 2010. At least 10 inflatables collapsed or were blown away in 2011, injuring more than 40 people.

Bounce house related injuries include 4,506 concussions and closed head injuries between 1995 and 2010. Other reported injuries included more than 17,000 broken bones and more than 10,000 bumps and bruises.

Here are some important safety tips provided to us by the Child Injury Prevention Alliance:

### *Setting Up an Inflatable Bouncer*

- Place the bouncer on a flat surface.
- Remove all rocks, sticks or objects such as sprinkler systems, or other items sticking up from the ground before setting up the bouncer.
- Make sure there is open space around all sides of the bouncer.
- Place the bouncer away from tree branches and/or power lines.
- If the bouncer will be set up on a hard surface, place a soft surface around the entrance/exit to the bouncer.



### *Safety and Injury Prevention Tips*

- Limit bouncer use to children 6 years of age and older.
- Only allow a bouncer to be used when an adult trained on safe bouncer use is present.
- The safest way to use a bouncer is to have only one child on it at a time.
- If more than one child will be on the bouncer at the same time, make sure that the children are about the same age and size (weight)
- Take off shoes, eyeglasses and jewelry and remove all sharp objects from your pockets.
- No rough play, tumbling, wrestling or flips.
- Stay away from the entrance or exit and the side walls of the bouncer while you are inside of it.
- If the bouncer begins to lose air, stop play and carefully exit the bouncer.



## *What You Should Know About Trampoline Safety*

Trampolines, like bounce houses, while fun, can create similar hazards and injuries.

To prevent trampoline injuries, follow the tips outlined for bounce houses such as always supervise children when they are on or around a trampoline and don’t allow children under 6 years old to be on a full-sized trampoline.

A new publication published by the PA Chapter of the American Trauma Society called “What You Should Know about Trampoline Safety” is a great resource to help prevent trampoline injuries. The publication explains safe ways of using a trampoline and also explains the dangers of a trampoline.

## *Motorcycle Riding Tough, Riding Safe*

When riding your motorcycle, it is best to wear a well-fitted motorcycle helmet. When you buy a helmet, make sure you’re wearing it correctly, and make sure that it meets safety standards.

First, try the helmet on. It should be comfortable to wear, but snug and tight against your head. A full-face helmet gives the most protection since it covers all of the head and face. Always fasten the helmet strap. If the helmet is not secured, it is not offering the optimal protection.

Did you know that all adult-sized motorcycle helmets now sold in the United States must have a sticker indicating Department of Transportation (DOT) approval and compliance, which means that the helmet meets certain basic impact standards? Don’t buy a helmet without a DOT sticker, as it may not meet safety standards.

Remember, helmets vary greatly in price and style. Buy one that suits you. A good helmet makes motorcycling safer and more pleasurable, as it cuts down on the wind noise and greatly reduces rider fatigue. Many motorcycle helmets are now made of light, new materials with many designs and colors to choose from.

If you drop your helmet onto a hard surface, or it receives a heavy blow, it is probably time to buy a new one. A motorcycle helmet is designed to absorb the impact of a blow, and a helmet should only do that once. If in doubt, get a new one!

## What is Stormwater Runoff?



Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent stormwater from naturally soaking into the ground.

## Why is stormwater runoff a problem?



Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing and providing drinking water.

*Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people.*

## The effects of Pollution



- Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. This sediment can also destroy aquatic plants and aquatic habitats.
- Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organism can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.
- Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.
- Debris—plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles and cigarette butts—washed into water bodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick or die from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.
- Polluted stormwater often affects drinking water source. This, in turn, can affect human health and increase drinking water treatment costs.

## PUBLIC WORKS NEWS, 2014

The Public Works Department is responsible for snow and ice control for 45 miles of Township roads. Additionally, the Department is under contract for snow and ice control for 17 miles of State roads and 4 miles of County roads.

The members of the Board of Supervisors serve as Road Masters for designated portions of the Township; Tom Gallant for Imperial, Janet Craig for Westbury and the RIDC, and Ray Chappell for Clinton.

For the year 2014 one focus of the Department will be using our limited resources on routine maintenance of roads based on priority of conditions. All Capital projects depend on available funding.

### For 2014, three Capital Improvement projects have been completed thus far:

1. Mill and overlay Phase II of RIDC Park West Drive and Technology Drive.
2. Re-pave McClaren Road.
3. Installation of a new Emergency Generator at the Municipal Building. This generator will power the entire facility and all electrical requirements within.

*A remaining Capital project starting soon will be a storm sewer on Moody Road.*

We plan to perform repairs on Main Street in preparation for future paving possibly in 2015.

In 2012 repairs were done on some of the narrow Imperial streets to prepare them for paving. We hope to complete the repairs this summer and pave the repaired streets. The Municipal Authority is currently installing new water lines in this area. We plan to pave later in summer

after the water line work and additional road and storm sewer repairs are complete. These include Berry Street, Nancy Street, Burns Street, Marshall Street, a portion of Anna Street, the upper section of Ida Street, and Kearns Street.

This is year 12 of the Township's mandatory involvement with Phase II of the Federal Storm Water laws known as the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System, or NPDES II. The Township web site has information and links to the Department of Environmental Protection and the Environmental Protection Agency for the public. This year the Township will continue inspecting storm water out-falls and testing run off water where required by the law. This may require entering private property on occasion. Permission to enter private property will be requested from any property owner where there may be a need to determine a source of illegal substances entering the storm sewers prior to workers entering the property unless there is an existing storm sewer easement allowing entry. The Township is required to inspect 25% of storm water out-falls annually. Elimination of pollution in the storm sewer system requires the assistance of all residents and businesses. Please remember that storm sewer inlets are not disposal sites for animal waste, grass clippings, leaves, gasoline, paint, paint thinner or engine oil, to name a few. Dumping these or other substances into storm sewers is illegal and harms the waterways that the storm water run off enters. These materials can also cause unnecessary storm sewer repairs that are costly to you, the tax payer.



## SOUTHERN BELTWAY PROJECT BREAKS GROUND...

A Groundbreaking for the new Southern Beltway ( Rte. 22 to I-79 ) Project took place on May 12, 2014 in Findlay Township. The ceremony, with Keynote Speaker Gov. Tom Corbett, marked the beginning of construction for the \$550M project at the southern end of the Findlay Connector. The 13-mile beltway project will extend from southwest Allegheny in Findlay Township into western Allegheny County near McDonald, where it will then connect to I-79 at the Washington – Allegheny County line in South Fayette. This section of the beltway will ease congestion on the Parkway West by providing a bypass route to the northern I-376 Corridor and the Pittsburgh International Airport in Findlay Township.



**NEW PAVILION AND AMENITIES AT RECREATION AND SPORTS COMPLEX**

One year from the date of groundbreaking, the Findlay Township Board of Supervisors held a ribbon cutting ceremony, as part of the Annual Independence Day Celebration on July 3rd. Project Managers, Gary Klingman and John O’Neal oversaw the construction of the pavilion, kitchen facilities and restrooms. CBF Contracting was the General Contractor, Valley Electric performed the Electrical Construction, and Newman Plumbing performed all plumbing work. Findlay Township Public Works erected the pavilion structure and also paved all walkways and a parking lot expansion. Rentals of the pavilion have already begun with future rentals extending into October. The Western Allegheny Community Library has reserved the facility for their Fall fundraiser. With a seating capacity of 150-165, the pavilion is combined with a kitchen facility that can also be rented. A new restroom facility has been added to service the rental facilities, along with the lighted soccer field.

\*Lane Construction has been awarded a contract by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation to make improvements to Route 30 from approximately the Allegheny/Beaver County line in Clinton to State Route 3080 (Burgettstown Road) midway between Clinton and Imperial, just east of the Findlay Connector (I-576). The project scope is as follows: milling, resurfacing, shoulder repair, base repair, drainage, guiderail, pavement marking, landslide repair and other miscellaneous construction. Work has already begun and should be completed by the end of Summer.

\*2014 Paving Program Complete. Youngblood Paving of Wampum, PA was contracted by the Township to complete our 2014 Paving Program, which included RIDC Parkwest Drive-Phase II, Technology Drive, Summit Park Drive and McClaren Road. 


